Children in foster care and their families are modern-day "widows and orphans." (James 1:27)

While the government has legal custody of children in foster care, Christians believe that the **church is the God-ordained institution** charged with caring for vulnerable children.

There are over 800 churches in metro Richmond and 500 kids in care. Over 100 are waiting for adoptive families.

People of faith want to "show up' even now. There are dozens of ways to **show up** for children in the foster care system and the families and workers who care for them. While the virus largely affects adults, the solution to the virus - social distancing - hurts kids.



Incidences of child abuse and neglect rise when children are home for long stretches of time with economically-strapped and emotionally-stressed parents.

Virginia is anticipating a flood of new children into care once social distancing ends, while simultaneously dealing with overburdened current foster families.

The church can both serve now and prepare now to be ready.



Your church members want to help vulnerable kids.

Practicing Christians are an astounding FIVE times more likely to adopt than the average adult.\*

Pastors all over the country are starting to dedicate ONE Sunday for a special service to **connect God's call** to care for "widows and orphans" to children and families in foster care.

There is something for everyone in your congregation to do.

Whether you're 17 years old and mow a foster family's lawn or 70 years old and can bake a lasagna for a newly adoptive family, you can do something.

Recent Barna research reveals a striking <u>77% of practicing</u> <u>Christians</u> believe that Christians have a personal responsibility to adopt. Not everyone is called to foster or adopt, but everyone is called to care.



Whether you, as pastoral staff, have personally fostered or adopted, you **reinforce** this message.

Whoever isn't fostering or adopting supports those who are with meals, errands, prayer, and tangible needs.

Adoption and reconciliation are core themes of the Gospel.

It works. Hearing from pastors equals a direct increase of action toward vulnerable kids and families.

#### **INVEST IN BIRTH PARENTS:**

Birth moms & dads can sometimes be invisible in the foster care and adoption faith conversations. But the Gospel narratives of redemption and reconciliation are reasons to serve & invite them into relationship.



#### **BECOME A LICENSED FOSTER**

FAMILY: Virginia has a shortage of foster families, but they are in desperate need for foster families who will take older kids, sibling sets or kids with special needs. Some localities will only train and approve families willing to take those populations of kids.

PURSUE "FOSTER TO ADOPT": Over 60% of parents who adopt out of foster care do so because they were the child(ren)'s foster family first. Very few foster to adopt families will tell you the journey was easy or fast. Navigating the system, birth family relationships, and trauma all take commitment.

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#### SUPPORT A FOSTER OR FOSTER-TO-ADOPT FAMILY:

See the back of this page for more info on the importance of "wrap-around support" for foster & foster-to-adopt families and their children.



EMBRACE SOCIAL WORKERS: Social workers are the first responders to kids in crisis & see more trauma in a day than most of see in our lifetimes. Social workers are routinely overworked and underpaid but are critical to children's outcomes.



INVEST IN AGED OUT YOUTH: Eightynine percent of children who age out of foster care are addicted, incarcerated, homeless or pregnant within 2 years of aging out. Each child who ages out costs taxpayers \$300,000 over their lifetimes in social welfare costs. Virginia is 47th in permanency.

Be at least 18 (!) years old Have room in their hearts, homes and schedules. Be willing to learn about trauma

Have to be married Have a college degree Own a home Make a lot of money Be a Stay at Home Parent (once social isolation ends) Have to add their foster child to their health insurance
